Avoid Harmful Products:

We have created easy guidelines to help you purchase safer products for your salon!

Polishes and Lacquers without:

- Toluene
- Dibutyl phthalate
- Formaldehyde

Nail Polish Thinners without:

- Toluene
- Methyl ethyl ketone (MEK)

Nail Polish Removers without:

• Ethyl or butyl acetate

Artificial Nails without:

Methyl methacrylate (Banned by the FDA)
