WHEREAS, by 1961, the public had access to less than six miles of shoreline, and the Bay was choked with raw sewage and industrial pollution; and

WHERAS, Save The Bay was founded in 1961 and mobilized thousands of residents to save San Francisco Bay from destruction, including the creation of the Bay Conservation and Development Commission; and

WHEREAS, the Bay is now ringed with 250 miles of public access, and tens of thousands of acres of wetlands are being restored, rather than paved over for development; and

WHEREAS, in 2011, Save The Bay continues its work with innovative campaigns to improve Bay water quality, prevent Bay fill, and reestablish tidal marsh.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED that this Board of Supervisors, County of Alameda, does hereby recognize the important work of Save The Bay and congratulates Save The Bay on 50 years of work to celebrate, protect and restore San Francisco Bay.
